 Begins with a general statement that identifies the topic Ideas are described in such a way that the reader can envision the topic. Language appeals to the five senses and helps to paint the picture. 	The rock was small; about the size of a toy car. You could hold it easily in your hand.  Begins with a general statement that identifies the topic Each paragraph describes one of the subtopics. Ideas are presented factually. Language is neutral and impersonal. 	Ramadan is an Islamic holy month that is recognized by Muslims world wide. Ramadan is always the ninth month of the Islamic lunar calendar, so it falls on different dates each year. During Ramadan Muslims fast during daylight. They do not eat, drink or smoke tobacco from sunrise to sunset. Each day begins before dawn with a meal called <i>Sahoor</i> and ends after dusk with a meal called <i>Iftar</i> . Prayers are also an important part of the Muslim faith and part of Ramadan. The European Union was formed after a lengthy evolution, and presently includes 15 countries. This choice gives the customer the chance to ask for more of this and less of that in an effort to create the perfect sandwich. Finally one must consider price. In this category, burger joints are generally the best option. In most cases you can get a simple burger for around a dollar. Even the smallest pizza will cost you at least 5 to 10 dollars; that is, unless you can buy your pizza by the slice, where you are compromising taste and variety in the name of price. Subs, while not as cheap as burgers, do offer the chance to earn "frequent buyer points" and ultimately get you something everyone wants—a free sub. In conclusion, it seems obvious that when one considers taste, variety, and price, the best bet is a sub. Tasty, made to order just the way you like it, and with a chance to get free food, subs are the way to go. Try one. I think you'll like it.
